Residents encouraged to sign up for website account

With the change to the new Montgomery Village website, residents are encouraged to sign up for a resident account to access both community and personal homeowner information. The new website eliminated long, hard-to-use menus and pages cluttered with information, and replaced them with streamlined menus, breadcrumb trails and accordion-style page layouts that contain useful information in an organized manner.

One major change from the previous website is the location of community information, including association policies, meeting minutes, board of directors information and architectural criteria. While each association has a basic page on the outward facing site, the detailed information is contained on the resident dashboard, and accessed by logging in. This reorganization aims to have more resident interaction on the website, and provides homeowners with only the information pertinent to their association and property. Residents with multiple properties are able to switch between properties inside their dashboard, having all their properties' information in one convenient place.

In addition to local association information, homeowners will also have access to ARB decisions for improvements to their property; Architectural and Covenant Violations; Recurring Charges; Transaction History, including balance due or account credits; and their Member Profile. This information is only viewable to residents with verified homeowner status. Renters will be granted access to view com-

Make a difference—run for the MVF Board of Directors

Concerned about the Village today and in the future? Are you concerned about how MVF is run, assessments, architectural control, recreation projects or other issues? Do you have something to say about these and other issues? Why not do something for yourself and your community?

In March, three candidates will be elected by the members (homeowners) of the Montgomery Village Foundation (MVF) to serve three-year terms on the nine member Board of Directors. The Board meets on the fourth Thursday of the month in the North Creek Board Room. These meetings are open to all residents for their ideas, input and support.

The Montgomery Village Foundation provides overall governance to the Village. It interacts with government agencies and oversees proposals for development or legislation affecting the Village. The MVF has two major responsibilities as outlined in its legal documents. First, MVF has responsibility for management and maintenance of MVF owned properties. These include MVF-owned recreational areas and facilities such as parks, lakes, pools, tennis courts and community centers.

Second, the MVF, through the Architectural Review Board, provides guidelines and restrictions on architectural changes with the objective of helping to maintain Village property values.

WHO CAN RUN FOR THE BOARD?

All interested applicants who are owners or residents of residential property in Montgomery Village are welcomed to apply. MVF urges residents to share their skills, views and energies by participating in Village governance. The Nominating Committee reviews all applications for nomination and considers applicants based on a number of factors including, but not limited to the following:

- Status as residential property owner or resident
- Length of residency in Montgomery Village





- 1. The Montgomery Village News Letters to the Editor section is a community forum for Montgomery Village residents and/or property owners. In addition, at the Editor's discretion, the Montgomery Village News may print letters of appropriate interest to residents from others, including representatives of local schools, governments and businesses. Campaign letters are prohibited, except for Montgomery Village Foundation and Village homes corporation elections. The views expressed in the Letters to the Editor section are those of the authors of the letters and not necessarily those of the Montgomery Village Foundation (MVF) or its Board of Directors.
- 2. The Montgomery Village News will make every effort to publish all letters received during the weeks prior to publication.
- 3. Typed letters and e-mail must be received no later than 5 p.m. on the Monday prior to publication and distribution, while handwritten letters must be received no later than noon on the Friday, one week prior to publication. When a holiday occurs on a deadline Monday, Letters to the Editor must be received no later than noon on the subsequent Tuesday prior to the Friday publication and distribution.
- 4. Letters must bear the writer's name, address and telephone number for verification purposes. The sole use of pen names, initials or the complete omission of a signature will eliminate a letter from consideration from publication. A request from the author to withhold the name or mark the letter anonymous will eliminate the letter from consideration. All letters are subject to condensa-

tion or deferral to the next issue by the

- editor for space considerations, if absolutely necessary. Editor is to so indicate any condensations.
- 6. All letters may not exceed 300 words. Longer letters will be eliminated from consideration for publication in the Village News. As time permits, the writers may be notified and given the opportunity to shorten the letter for future publication. - 7. The Village News respects the privacy of individuals and residents: letters should not contain references to specific persons, except when endorsing candidates for MVF or Village homes corporation elections or referencing a previously published article with a

- 9. The Letters to the Editor section is not a forum for extensive debates; MVF encourages residents to use other avenues such as facebook and twitter for timely discussion.
- All e-mail is subject to this policy. The e-mail subject line must read "Letter to the Editor."
- All e-mail letters must include the writer's full name, address and telephone number for verification.
- As with letters delivered to the MVF office in person or by the U.S. Postal Service, the Montgomery Village News will make every effort to publish all letters received prior to the publication

munity documents, but not property information.

To sign up for an account, click the "Join" link in the upper right hand corner of the website. After the account is verified by staff, residents will receive an e-mail alerting them to account approval. Once logged in, residents can click the "My Account" link in the upper right hand corner to access documents and property information.

In addition to the Resident Dashboard, residents can also elect to receive SMS/Text Alerts when they sign up for an account. This service will provide the Montgomery Village Foundation one more convenient way to send important community information about events, closures, reminders and more directly to residents.

Rental Facilities in the Village

Looking for space to hold your party, celebration or sports practice? Look no further than Lake Marion or North Creek community center. Montgomery Village residents who pay the Designated User fee are able to rent these centers for their non-alcoholic private parties or functions.

Lake Marion has a wood-floored room that can be rented for parties with a maximum capacity of 85 people. There also is a full-size gymnasium available for rent at Lake Marion.

North Creek is a tile-floored L-shaped room that may be divided into two smaller rooms with a maximum capacity of 125 people.

We are currently accepting rental requests for functions to be held through March 2016. Fees for these facilities begin at \$50 per hour and require a \$250 security deposit. Requests must be submitted at least three weeks in advance. Potential renters can obtain a copy of the "Procedures on the Private Use of Facilities" and the "Private Rental Request From" from the MVF Office, 10120 Apple Ridge Road or online at www.montgomeryvillage.com. Please remember that all functions must be non-alcoholic, and that the renter must be present the entire length of the rental.

The 2015 White House Christmas Ornament

Once again, the Lake Marion Lasers swim team's annual fundraiser is the sale of the White House Christmas Ornament. A LITTLE HISTORY ABOUT THIS YEAR'S ORNAMENT

The 2015 White House Christmas ornament honors the administration of Calvin Coolidge, who served as the 30th president of the United States from 1923 to 1929. A depiction of the first National Christmas tree crafted from shiny brass plated with nickel and 24k gold is illuminated from within and hung with ornaments representing the events of Coolidge's unique life and presidency.

The 14 colorful ornaments represented on the front of the tree are beautifully silhouetted in 24k gold on the back of the design. The windows of the Coolidge White House glow from within with the north and south facades featured on front and back of the ornament respectively.

The sweeping banner anchoring the tree reads "White House Christmas 2015" on the front and "1923 Calvin Coolidge 1929" on the back. Tucked discretely on the back of the ornament is the switch for the new LED light feature included in this year's design.

HOW DO I RUN FOR MVF OFFICE?


It's easy. MVF has made it simple for candidates to serve

Architectural Standards resources available to all

The Architectural Standards (AS) Department has provided the Village with a variety of resources to assist and support homeowners with their many exterior property changes or architectural needs. Below are listed many of these informational resources available to all online, at the Montgomery Village Foundation Office and through many of our dedicated individuals.

VILLAGE NEWS

Various feature articles are written by the Architectural Standards review and compliance staff throughout the year to update and notify homeowners about changes within their community or the Village itself. These articles contain informative features ranging from community door styles to proactive compliance schedules. Other architectural articles are generated from various questions the department receives on a daily basis. Also, all Architectural Review Board (ARB) decisions are published following each scheduled ARB meeting and may be found on the Architectural Standards page.

WEBSITE

The MVF website is a wonderful source for many Architectural Standards items and issues. Resources within the website include all architectural articles in the *Village News*, community criteria for all 65 communities, Villagewide guidelines, checklists, the Step-by-Step Guide to the architectural process, and other frequently asked questions. Residents can also submit a Property Improvement Request online.

ARB

The Architectural Review Board is an excellent source of information when applying for an exterior change. Their individual and collective wealth of architectural knowledge upon review brings invaluable assistance to each homeowner, each community and the Village as a whole.

MVF DESIGN CONSULTANT

Montgomery Village Foundation (MVF) employs a parttime consultant, George Smith,



who has been with the Village from almost day one. His major role is to assist in the color and material changes throughout the Village and is the "go to" person for all major replacement materials. His knowledge and assistance over the years has been invaluable to the Village.

THE ANNUAL ARCHITECTURAL STANDARDS HOME SHOW

This annual spring show features the Architectural Standards Department staff, the ARB and the design consultant, as well as numerous exterior contractors. The show provides homeowners and families with educational information concerning the architectural standards process as well as providing them with the opportunity to connect with many contractors.

The 2016 Home Show has been scheduled from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Saturday, March 19 at Lake Marion Community Center, 8821 East Village Avenue. Be sure to mark your calendar!



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Exterior holiday decorations and lights

As the holidays approach, the Architectural Standards Department has developed guidelines for homeowners to follow regarding the placement of holiday decorations and lights on the exterior of homes in the yards of residential properties in Montgomery Village.

The guideline details that this category includes, but is not limited, to objects such as holiday wreaths, holiday house and tree lights, hanging icicles, decorative helium figures and animals, decorative plaques and signage.

All holiday decorations and lights may be installed up to 45 days before the holiday event and must be removed within 45 days following the holiday event

STEDWICK SIGNALS

A good walk spoiled

One of the many things that I enjoy about our community is the ability to go for a walk in our neighborhoods. We have great neighborhoods that allow us to walk and enjoy nature and the different styles of architecture that make Stedwick so great. Unfortunately, while on these walks, we happen upon sights that detract from the walk-recycling bins and trash receptacles that are not stored properly. They are left in plain sight (i.e., in front of the garage or on the side of the house). Stedwick has a trash policy that basically states that these storage containers should not be visible from the street.

The policy states:

Trash Storage - Until household refuse is properly placed for collection or hauled to an acceptable deposit site, it shall be stored within airtight, waterproof containers that are vermin proof and meet Montgomery County standards while stored at the exterior of the residence.

Plastic bags, cardboard boxes and/or paper sacks do not qualify as acceptable storage containers. Storage containers for either refuse or recyclables are not to be kept in front yards, on stoops, driveways or sidewalks of any unit and should not be visible from the street.

Let's not detract from the beauty of our homes by not taking the time to properly store our trash and recycling containers.

LEAF COLLECTION

We had our first leaf removal the week of November 9, but it rained twice that week, which made the leaf removal difficult. The contractor did get it all done by the next week, but rain and debris make the effort less than efficient. We have our final leaf removal during the week of December 7. Again, rake the leaves to the front curb and they will be removed.

In the last addition of the *Village News*, our board president, Michael Gronsky, informed us what happens at board meet-

ings. One part of the meetings is the committee reports. The chair for each committee provides the report. Did you know that you can volunteer to be on one of the committees without being a board member? It is a great way to be involved in our community. 2015 year end review and 2016 preview

Many projects were completed this year throughout East Village, including:

- Replacement of tot lots in Meadowgate and Glenbrooke
- Tree pruning in The Downs I & II
- Curb painting in Essex Place, Holly Pointe, Glenbrooke, Wethersfield and The Reach
- Asphalt repairs throughout the community
- 15 replacement trees approved for Montgomery County's RainScapes program rebates

The following projects are scheduled for 2016:

- Replacement of the tot lot in The Reach
- Replace the wooden retaining wall in Holly Pointe
- Tree pruning in Ashford, Wethersfield, Holly Pointe and Glenbrooke
- Asphalt work, 2-inch mill and repave four streets in Ashford
- Concrete curb and gutter in the areas where asphalt is replaced

2016 BUDGET & ASSESSMENTS APPROVED

At the November 17 East Village Board of Directors meeting, the board approved the proposed budget, which included an \$11.40 annual increase in assessments (for a total annual assessment of \$557.44). This increased residents' quarterly assessment by \$2.87 each quarter (for a total quarterly assessment of \$139.36). Assessment letters will be mailed out to all residents confirming this change for 2016.

TRASH RULES & REGULATIONS

The East Village board reminds residents that both the county and East Village Homes Corporation (EVHC) require all trash to be placed in "vermin-proof" containers. A "vermin-proof" container is a trash can with a tightly fitting

lid. Trash bags are not verminproof! There has been a surge in loose trash bags being left out for collection throughout the community. EVHC trash collection days are Tuesdays and Fridays. Recycling collection is only on Fridays, and trash and recycling containers should be placed out after 7 p.m. the night before collection.

EVHC CALL FOR CANDIDATES

Are you an East Village resident interested in getting involved and volunteering to help make a difference in your community? If yes, East Village residents can apply to become an elected Director of the East Village Homes Corporation (EVHC) for the three year term March 2016 to March 2019. Applications are due by 5 p.m. on Tuesday, Jan. 12, 2016. FINAL LEAF COLLECTION

The second and final scheduled leaf collection in East Village will be held during the week of December 14, weather dependent on exact timing. Please be sure that your leaves are raked to the curb in time for removal on the scheduled week. In the event of a weather delay, the collection will shift to the next calendar day. If you miss the scheduled collection, you can always collect leaves in special paper lawn bags, and place them curbside for pickup each Friday morning as part of the county's normally scheduled recycling collection. Please also consider being a good neighbor to others in your neighborhood who may need assistance raking and collecting leaves.

SECURITY SERVICES

Upon numerous complaints from residents regarding security patrolling from American Protective Services, the board solicited open bids for the provision of security patrol services for Patton Ridge. After careful review of several bids, the board selected U.S. Security Associates, Inc. (USA), and they will begin on Monday, Dec. 7.

USA is a large, nationwide firm that employs state of the art communication and tracking technology to enhance their security coverage. USA will be on site from 6 p.m. to 3 a.m. and 7 p.m. to 3 a.m. during Daylight Saving Time. They will have a community by community map that indicates every Patton Ridge home by address, and you can expect an enhanced visible security presence.

North Village November board meeting

by the North Village Board of Directors

The regular meeting of the North Village board of directors was held on Monday, Nov. 23, in the North Creek Board Room. The approval of the 2016 budget was the top item on the agenda. We received no written comments on the published budget. There was some discussion at the board meeting during residents time and in the course of the meeting. The board of directors approved the draft budget as published last month. As a result, the quarterly charge for the North Village portion of your assessment will increase from \$164.23 to \$170.93 per quarter. At the same time, the Montgomery Village Foundation assessment (including the Designated User fee) will increase from \$157.68 to \$161.43 per quarter.

The treasurer provided an overview of the October financial reports. Referring to the balance sheet, she stated that our operating cash account is comfortable and that receivables have been running lower. As a result she moved that the board cancel the money due to the operating account from the reserves account. This was money borrowed earlier from the operating account to pay for the recent road resurfacing project. In other financial business, the board approved the Reserve Study recently completed by DMA Associates.

The treasurer also mentioned that Montgomery Village Foundation (MVF) did an analysis of the MVF delinquent accounts across different sections of the Village. The analysis shows that more North Village residents are delinquent than residents in other sections of Montgomery Village and have larger past due amounts. Since MVF assessments are collected along with North Village's assessments, it is very likely that more North Village residents are delinquent in paying the North Village assessments as well.

The maintenance committee chairperson stated that we will plan to upgrade landscaping at a number of entrance signs throughout North Village next year. She said that she would send out requests for bids during the winter. It was noted that some of the flowers and trees need to be reevaluated since they may not have been appropriate for the locations in which they were planted. Speaking of signs, management ordered two stop signs and two caution signs for Salem's Grant and Essex Place to mitigate the increased traffic issues occurring in these communities.

It was noted that the first leaf pickup went well this year. However, it was mentioned that the leaves fell early this year and the first pickup could have been sooner. However, the schedule is determined weeks in advance, and it is hard to predict precisely when the leaves will fall. The maintenance chairperson was concerned that our tot lot had not been cleared of leaves during the first leaf pickup.

In other maintenance items, another \$8,000 has been approved for tree removal this year to be performed by the Kevin Elliott Company. This takes us considerably over the 2015 budget for tree removal and is indicative of the rapid deterioration of many of our trees.

The board was reminded by residents that parking in our townhouse communities is difficult. Parking areas are not adequate for each townhome to have two assigned spaces. The board can do little about this. When the developer built our communities some 30 odd years ago, it was the norm to own one and sometimes two cars. Today, households have three, four and even five cars. Residents must be respectful of each other and use the limited space equitably, especially during the holidays.

The last major item on the agenda was the selection of a new security firm. All of the bids that we received were well over the cost of our last contract. The cost of a new security firm is the driver in the 2016 assessment increase. We will be negotiating a new contract over the course of this month.

2016 ADOPTED BUDGET

The Middle Village board officially adopted the 2016 Budget at their meeting on November 3. The budget reflects an increase to the 2015 assessment amount as noted on the budget draft sent previously. Assessment payments will be due monthly beginning Friday, Jan. 1, 2016, instead of quarterly. Payment coupons will be sent before the end of the year.

LIGHT REPLACEMENT

Montgomery Lighting is continuing the light project that includes replacing pole lights and underground wiring throughout the community. The project will require digging in various areas of the community and is expected to take another 2 to 3 months to complete.

SNOW REMOVAL

O'Leary Asphalt will be providing snow removal service to Middle Village and will be keeping equipment in the community. There will be a storage container, a salt pile and a bobcat on Ridgeline Drive throughout the winter season.

PET OWNERS

We received several complaints about dogs roaming the neighborhoods off leash, illegally entering yards and making yards unsafe/unsanitary. Others are complaining because neighbors aren't cleaning up after their pet(s). We wanted to share the law prior to you being reported and required to pay a fine:

Dog at large - Any dog is at large if it is outside the owner's premises and not leashed, unless it is a service dog, is in a dog exercise area designated by the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning

Commission, or is participating in an approved activity.

The common area of a homeowner's association, condominium or cooperative is not the owner's premises. Penalty for Violation: \$100 for first offense, \$500 for each subsequent violation.

Unwanted Contact - The pet owner must prevent unwelcome or unsolicited threatening physical contact or close proximity to a person or a domestic animal that occurs outside the owner's property that may cause alarm in a reasonable person, such as biting, chasing, tracking, inhibiting movement, or jumping. Penalty for Violation: \$500.

Animal Defecation ("pooper scooper" law) (Montgomery County Code, Sec. 5-203(a) (2)) - An owner must not allow an animal to damage or defecate on property outside of the owner's property. An animal may defecate on public property or the common area of property in which the owner shares an interest if the owner immediately removes and disposes of the feces by a sanitary method approved by the Director. Feces may be picked up in a plastic bag. If this bag is placed inside another plastic bag, it may be put out for disposal in your normal household trash. Penalty for Violation: \$100.

Animal Trespass (Montgomery County Code, Sec. 5-203(a)(3)) – An owner must not allow an animal to enter private property without the property owner's permission. Penalty for Violation: \$100.

HOMES CORPORATION CALL FOR CANDIDATES

Volunteers needed for homes corporation boards of directors

Each year, the Village homes corporations seek candidates for election to their boards of directors. Interested residents are invited to submit applications for candidacy to the Nominating Committee of their local homes corporation.

Directors of homes corporations are responsible for setting assessments and managing the maintenance of all open spaces, streets, paths and lights that belong to the individual homes corporation.

Basic qualifications for board membership are time and interest, but whatever other knowledge, training, skills or experience one has will almost certainly be used in some capacity.

1. According to the documents, a candidate is not required to be a resident of Montgomery Village, except in Whetstone Homes Corporation and North Village Homes Corporation, where the candidate is required to be a resident homeowner. However, resident candidates must be in good standing with the Montgomery Village Foundation and their respective homes corporation with regard to covenants and must be current in all assessment payments.

2. To apply for candidacy, a prepared statement of the applicant's qualifications and interests must be delivered to any member of the Nominating Committee or to the Montgomery Village Foundation office, 10120 Apple Ridge Road, no later than 5 p.m. on the closing dates stated in the box.

- 3. A candidate may be solicited or may volunteer. A resident nominating another resident must secure his/her written consent.
- 4. The number of candidates is unlimited.
- 5. All nominees will be requested to submit a single page (typewritten, double spaced) statement, which will be reproduced in the December, January or February issue of the Village News and will be sent to all voters along with the ballots (standard form will be supplied to board nominees).
- 6. Also, per a new Montgomery County Law, effective January 1, 2016, if elected, candidates must participate in a Montgomery County Commission on Common Ownership Communities (CCOC)-approved board member training class, to be scheduled and completed within 90 days of the start of

their term of service.

Ballots will be mailed to the electorate either in December, January or February, depending on the specific corporation's election calendar.

In addition to electing directors, each homes corporation also elects a representative and an alternate representative to the MVF for one-year terms. Suggested names for the position will appear on the ballots.

Each board of directors consists of nine directors who serve three-year terms. The terms are staggered, creating three vacancies every year.

MV Kids Learn About Clouds



For thousands of years, people have been looking up to the sky, seeing things and people in the shapes of the clouds and wondering how those soft, billowy white things can stay afloat. We now know that clouds form when the temperature of the air reaches the point at which water vapor becomes a liquid, or condensates. The liquid collects on dust particles in the air, and that's what we see when we see clouds.

Who named the clouds?

Clouds were fascinating to young Luke Howard of England. Luke lived from 1773 to 1864. His father wanted him to go to grammar school, but Luke was more interested in nature. Before 1800, people didn't have names for the types of clouds in the sky. They were just being investigated for the first time in laboratories in England and Europe.

When Luke was in school, volcanoes erupted in Japan and Iceland, which caused brilliantly beautiful clouds, sunrises and sunsets. Luke wanted to know more, so he eventually joined a group of scientists called the Askesians (searchers after knowledge). Luke had been studying clouds so much that he wrote a paper about them and presented it to the Askesians. The paper he wrote was so well received that it was published and is an important part of our science history today. Today, we still use the Latin names Luke assigned to the clouds.

Ten basic types of clouds can be broken down into where they develop in the sky.

High clouds are Cirrus, Cirrostratus and Cirrocumumus.

Mid clouds are Altostratus, Altocumulus and Nimbostratus.

Low clouds are Cumulus, Stratus, Cumulonimbus and Stratocumulus.



Luke Howard separated clouds into three types:

Cumulus, which means *heap* in Latin. These clouds are heaps with flat bottoms and cauliflower tops.

Stratus, which means *layer* in Latin. These clouds are wider and thicker than cumulus, and look like a blanket or a mattress.

Cirrus, which means *curl* in Latin. These clouds are wispy and look like the curls of a child's hair. To name clouds that create rain, Luke called the clouds nimbus, which is Latin for the word rain.


Cloud types identified today



What do you see?

Look in the sky on different kinds of days to see what type of clouds are present during different weather conditions. Keep a note-book of the kinds you see and compare similar weather conditions to help predict when it might rain or snow.

Also, be on the lookout for different shapes in the clouds. Use your imagination and see what objects you can find in the sky! Just remember to wear sunglasses when looking up, and don't stare directly at the sun!



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

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
