Three candidates for the Montgomery Village Foundation (MVF) Board of Directors were elected to fill the three ending term seats on the Board. After about eight weeks of campaigning, meet and greet events

and a candidates' forum, the results have been tallied.

On Saturday, March 16, the Election Committee, community volunteers and MVF staff counted ballots received in the weeks prior to the deadline.

Counting began around 9 a.m. and was completed by noon. Of the four candidates in the election, Scott Dyer, Doniele Ayres and Andrew Bird received the most votes, respectively.

outgoing board members Laura Franke and Jim Marsh, who opted not to seek re-election after their first term on the MVF Board. Dyer was re-elected to another three-year term; this will be Dyer's fourth term on the MVF Board.

New members installed, service awards given at MVF Annual Meeting

The Montgomery Village Foundation (MVF) Board of Directors held its annual meeting on Thursday, March 28 in North Creek Community Center. During the meeting, newly elected members to the Board, Doniele Ayres and Andrew Bird, and incumbent Scott Dyer, were installed for their 2019-2022 term. Outgoing directors Laura Franke and Jim Marsh were thanked for their service to the Board and the community. Ayres, Bird and Dyer were announced as the winning candidates after the March 16 ballot counting.

In addition, Board Student Representative Nadia Makmak was installed and seated. Makmak is a junior at Watkins Mill High School and was selected by the Board to represent youth in the Village as a nonvoting member. Her term will end in December and include a summer internship at MVF.

Board President Glenn Gargan opened the meeting with an address to the Village, reflecting on the highlights of 2018, noting it was an eventfilled year and he was pleased to be a part of the progress made thus far. Gargan highlighted new initiatives and projects aimed at updating

amenities, such as the new all abilities playground at the Apple Ridge Recreation Area; the upgraded field at South Valley Park; energy-efficient lighting at the MVF Office; and the progress on the installation of a digital sign.

Gargan also reflected on ways MVF continues to engage with county and state officials in an effort to support all residents. He noted lobbied efforts to maintain the roadway reimbursement program and the addition of 100 new street lights installed along Montgomery Village Avenue. Additionally, Gargan was pleased to continue working with the police, especially the newly added Montgomery Village Team, under the 6th District's watch.

He noted the development projects on the golf course, Village Center and Professional Center properties, showing excitement about the slow progress being made. Gargan said Monument Realty is close to a contract with a home builder; renovation at the Village Center should begin soon; and he is awaiting the next steps for Lidl, the grocery chain that



Montgomery Village claims 31st Tree City USA title

Montgomery Village has been named a 2018 Tree City USA community by The National Arbor Day Foundation to honor its commitment to community forestry. It is the 31st consecutive year Montgomery Village has received this national recognition.

According to the National Arbor Day Foundation, Montgomery Village has met four criteria to become a Tree City USA, including a tree board or department; a tree care ordinance; maintaining a community forestry budget; and holding an official Arbor Day observance.

Montgomery Village celebrated Arbor Day 2018 on Saturday, April 21 with an expanded program at the North Creek Nature Center including

a volunteer shrub planting activity, craft activities, seedling giveaways and various vendor information tables.

Montgomery Village is committed to effective urban forestry management. Maintaining this importance resource is vital to our public infrastructure. Cleaner air, improved storm water management, energy savings and increased property values are among the benefits enjoyed by Tree City USA communities.

Activity Card Update 2019

Before you head to the pool, make sure you have taken the necessary steps to ensure that you will receive your Activity Cards on time! Property owners should have received an Information Letter and Rights Form (if needed) in the mail. Even if there are no changes, please return the forms to the MVF Office.

Residents of Patton Ridge and South Village (Dockside, Millrace, Nathan's Hill, Grover's Forge, Hamptons), will be receiving new photo Activity Cards this year. Residents from communities that received photo Activity Cards in previous years - East Village, Eastgate, Maryland Place, Middle Village (Clubside) Northgate, North Village, Poplar Spring, Stedwick and Whetstone – who do not yet have their photo Activity Card, will need to come to the MVF Office to get one this year.

Starting Wednesday, May 1, photos will be taken at the MVF Office, 10120 Apple Ridge Road,

during regular business hours, Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. (closed May 27 and July 4). Beginning Thursday, May 16, the office will remain open until 7 p.m. on Thursday evenings through June 27 and also be open

on Saturdays from 9:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. from May 18 through July 6. Please remember to bring proof of residence, such as a driver's license, so that we may take your photo.

If an assessment account is not at a zero balance as of April 30 in any year, beginning May 1, payment of any prior balance, as well as the full assessment amount through the end of the current fiscal year, must be received as a condition for issuance of an Activity Card or Validation Sticker.

Residents will need a current



Validation Sticker on their photo activity card for entry to all MVF, Inc. pools. Validation Stickers for the residents who have received their photo Activity Card in previous years will be mailed in early May, to those residents who have returned their Information Letter and Rights Forms (if needed), if their assessment account is current, and there are no architectural violations on the property.

Enjoy MVF pools this summer

Summer will be here soon, and it is time to start thinking about enjoying the MVF pools with your family and friends.

Here are a couple of important things to remember in order to get your Activity Cards or stickers so that you can enjoy the pools:

- The Montgomery Village Foundation assessment is an annual assessment due in full on January 1 of each year. Homeowners may choose to pay their assessment annually or quarterly (four payments per year).
- If a homeowner chooses to pay quarterly and has a

MVF Board approves digital sign at March meeting

Following a sign variance approval from Montgomery County, the Montgomery Village Foundation (MVF) Board of Directors approved a sole source bid from Kerley Signs for the purchase and installation of a digital sign. The project has been a discussion topic for some time, and was funded in the 2018 budget; after several site identifications and time needed for the variance application, the Board has given the green light for this project.

The sign will be a high resolution (8mm), double sided, monument-type along East Village Avenue at Lake Marion Community Center. This location was chosen for its proximity to an MVF facility and utilities, as well as the low impact to neighboring homes and high visibility to pedestrian and ve-

hicular traffic. The project is expected to take several months to get the necessary permits and equipment ordered before installation later this year.

OTHER AGENDA ITEMS

In financial related items, the Board approved and accepted the 2018 Audited Financial Report from auditors DeLeon & Stang. The firm provided an unmodified opinion and a favorable review of internal controls. The Board also authorized the EVP to execute a proposal for a Level I and II Capital Reserve Plan Study Update. The Level II update is recommended every five years; MVF's last update was performed in 2014.

For recreation purposes, the Board approved a multi-year bid for playground resurfacing of multiple MVF playgrounds. The wood fiber replacement contract was awarded to Play-

ground Specialists, Inc. \$35 per cubic yard for 2019 to 2021. Additionally, the Board approved revisions to the MVF Policy and Procedures for Swim Team Use of Foundation Facilities. Changes to the policy were necessitated by changes in safety standards already implemented by the swim teams. Proposed changes were reviewed with swim team reps and the Recreation Committee before coming to the MVF Board.

EVP REPORT

EVP Dave Humpton reported that he is working with Lidl, the owner of the Professional Center, to address vandalism and vagrancy concerns at the site. Residents are reminded that this is private property and walking through the site is considered trespassing. Humpton also noted that Lakeforest Mall, including the

four anchor stores, was for sale at auction; there was no other update for the site at this time.

Finally, he noted that he and General Counsel Christopher Hitchens continue to track legislation pertaining to HOAs and COAs.

TREASURER'S REPORT

CFO Daniel Salazar gave the financial report for the year-to-date (YTD) and the month of February. He noted YTD Revenue as favorable to the budget, largely due to Investment Income. Personnel and Office Expenses were also favorable to the budget, with Landscaping and Maintenance unfavorable due to snow removal earlier this year.

Contributions to Reserves were made in accordance with the budget, in the amount of \$218,603 YTD. The Capital

Contribution Fee received \$13,761 YTD.

MVF maintains its solid financial position with over \$8.7 million in Cash and Investments. The MVF Operating Fund continues to maintain \$1.8 million in Undesignated Reserves.

NEXT MEETING

The next MVF Board of Directors meeting is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, April 25 in the North Creek Board Room, 20125 Arrowhead Road. The meeting begins promptly at 7:30 p.m. with Residents Time. Residents are invited and encouraged to attend. 

purchased the Professional Center.

In closing, he encouraged residents to appreciate, take advantage of and get involved in all the Village has to offer. He thanked staff and resident volunteers for all they do to make the Village what it is.

MVF Chief Financial Officer Daniel Salazar reviewed the 2018 financials, following an unmodified opinion given in the 2018 MVF Audit by the audit firm DeLeon & Stang. Salazar noted that in addition to the unmodified opinion, the auditors gave favorable review of MVF's internal control pro-

Net Income was reported as \$535,274, compared to a budget of \$769,155, and Revenue was reported as \$8,4042,143 compared to a budget of \$8,560,396; this was mainly due to poor Investment Income return. However, MVF ended the year favorable to the budget due to other cost centers performing

Contributions to Reserves were made according to the budget, totaling \$1,250,918.

Salazar said that \$720,694 was invested in MVF Assets, including the South Valley Park field renovation, and the playgrounds at the Apple Ridge Recreation Area, Stedwick Community Center and Whetstone Community Center.

Salazar also noted that the Reserve Portfolio increased \$410,000 since 2015. The Capia significant increase over the budget due to the sale of the Cider Mill Apartments. He also reported that camps and class revenue exceeded the budget; 2018 marked a 5-year high for the previously slow-growing revenue stream.

Finally, Salazar was pleased to report that due to the continued success of the MVF Collection Policy, delinquencies continue to be on the decline. He noted a Receivable balance decrease of \$445,000 since 2014.

During the meeting, the Board also honored several community members, organizations and staff members for their volunteer efforts, service to the community or years of dedicated employment.

Park of the Month: South Valley Park

South Valley Park is one of Montgomery Village's largest parks, with the parking area located at 19003 Watkins Mill Road. The 32-acre park includes Dr. Gordon W. Bowie Music Pavilion, lighted athletic fields, a playground, creeks, ponds, picnic areas, gazebos, footbridges, paved paths and a restroom and concession stand that is open during events.

The athletic field at South Valley Park was renovated in 2018. This field, which is host to a large number of sporting events, was in less than ideal condition due to years of use, incorrect grading and various other issues. For part of 2018, the field was taken out of service to have an irrigation system installed, to be regraded and to install Bermudagrass for the field's playing surface. The field reopened for reserved use later that summer.

The new grass type and renovations have created an ideal playing field for a variety of sports, and MVF staff is excited to see residents using the field for the 2019 season. This field is by permit use only or for other MVF approved events. Applications to reserve the field can be found online at www.montgomeryvillage.com.

One of the unique and popular features of this park is the Dr. Gordon W. Bowie Music Pavilion. The pavilion was named after Dr. Gordon W. Bowie, who was the director of the Montgomery Village Community Band from 1999 until 2012, when he lost his battle with cancer. The pavilion was dedicated in his honor on June 17, 2012. Dr. Gordon W. Bowie Music Pavilion hosts a variety of events and programs throughout the year, including the Flashlight Egg Hunt during the month of April. During the summer months the pavilion is home to Montgomery Village's series "Summers at South Valley Park." More information on the summer schedule of free activities can be found at www. montgomeryvillage.com/events/ summers-south-valley-park.

In addition, the park offers a unique playground (installed in 2008) with activities for a variety of ages. The playground features a track ride, swings, a variety of climbers and selection of other fun features. Picnic tables can be found along various walking paths throughout the park. The park is a great place to spend time on a weekend to enjoy a concert and the natural surroundings.


Local artists display their talents



If you're interested in installing a shade structure to help you enjoy BBQ season, remember to first check out our community guidelines on shade structures to ensure that the shade structure you envision for your outdoor oasis is in harmony with the aesthetics of your home and community. Then, visit www.montgomery *village.com/pir* to apply for it.

Examples of shade structures include canopies, gazebos, large Sunbrellas and even pergolas. Below is an excerpt of some of the guidelines to keep in mind when selecting the shade structure for your home. For the full list, visit www.montgomeryvillage.com/ residents/architectural-standards/ village-wide-guidelines.

• Any shade structure (permanent or temporary) requires prior approval. Decisions are made based on the type of house and the location, size, materials, and color of the structure.

- Only one shade structure will be considered per home and must be maintained in good condition at all times.
- Free standing shade structures are permitted yearround in the rear yards of single-family detached houses, rear yards of townhouses, and rear yards of zero-lot-line houses. They are permitted in enclosed yards of back-toback and four-plex houses on a seasonal basis between the months of April and October.
- If the shade structure has a separate fabric cover, only cloth fabric, in neutral colors, will be permitted.

If you are unsure whether your shade structure complies with the above guidelines, please feel free to reach out to the Architectural Standards Department for further assistance. And don't forget to apply at www.montgomery village.com/pir and wait for your decision before making any purchases. Apply before you buy!

2019 Patton Ridge President's Message

It's only March, but we have jumped off to a fast start on many projects that we approved in 2018. I have lived in Patton Ridge for 35+ years and I cannot remember ever seeing our trees trimmed. Well, that oversight was corrected big time when Brightview undertook a Patton Ridgewide effort, at our request, to identify and trim all trees in the community that were in need. This effort was concentrated primarily on deciduous trees in order to remove dead or dangerous branches and to enhance the growth pattern of the trees in order to maintain their health and continued growth. This process also resulted in the identification of a few trees that needed removal because

We also started on the repair of our underground storm water management system by fixing the seven most problematic areas in the system. We have asked our contractor, Busy Services, to repair the next most needy three to five problems in 2019. These improvements are not visible, but help us to avoid major problems that can cost tens of thousands of dollars to repair if we have a major break in the system.

The board of directors continues to focus on potential problem analysis throughout our infrastructure in order to avoid more expensive repairs in the coming years. We contracted for and received a revised Reserve Study last year to help us plan and execute projects for the next twenty years. We are seeking bids to replace the roof on the Arrowhead Circle gazebo, and we will be looking at our asphalt

walkways in most need of repair. There are also several curbside and in-ground water catch basins in need of repair.

We are nearing the end of our one-year agreement with the county to maintain our pet waste stations. The county has retrieved 1,006.2 pounds of waste from the five stations that have been in place for one year. Given the obvious success of this program, we will contact the county to determine what arrangements may be available to install additional stations. Thank you to all our residents who have made this program a success. You are performing a valuable service to our community.

I am certain that you noted that we changed our towing and parking policy in early February. We will continue to review our policies to improve the operation and appearance of Patton Ridge as needed. Now if we could solve the trash problems, that would be real progress. However, only you as residents can fix this problem by following community and county policies, and by reporting issues when you observe them to our community manager.

I want to inform renters that you have an obligation to follow the same rules as your homeowner. Our policies regarding trash and exterior maintenance can be found on your Member Dashboard at www.montgomeryvillage.com—these are available to renters as well. I want to remind absentee homeowners that you have an obligation to ensure that your renters are obeying all Patton Ridge policies.

This is a good place to publicly thank our board of directors for their continued dedica-

tion to the management of our community. We are blessed with an excellent board that can identify issues and talk through differences in an amiable manner. We strive to make meetings interesting, and we have board members with a great sense of humor and no ego problems. Larry Nicholson was elected to another three-year term as a result of the ballots you submitted, and Lauren Hydorn was appointed to fill one of our three vacancies at our March meeting. I was elected to another term as president, and Brian Post was reelected as treasurer. Perhaps two of our residents would like to volunteer to fill the remaining vacancies on the board.

The Patton Ridge Board meets nine times a year on the fourth Tuesday of the month at 7 p.m. Meetings rarely last more than two hours, and 90 minutes is the usual norm. That is somewhere between a 13½ and an 18-hour annual commitment to help maintain and improve our community. Requirements for board membership include current assessment payments, lack of maintenance or architectural violations, consistent ability to attend meetings and a desire to see Patton Ridge thrive. Stedwick Homes Corporation 2018 Annual Statement

The 2018 year was a good one for the Stedwick Homes Corporation. Overall expenses were below budget, and investments have been made to enhance the appearance and the environmental quality of our community. However, we continue to be confronted with significant parking and trash problems.

The Stedwick Homes Corporation's 2018 financial status indicates an increase in overall expenses compared to 2017, but still slightly under budget. Snow removal and storm damage repair costs were significantly under budget. Maintenance and repairs and trash removal costs all increased.

Significant investments were made in our community's infrastructure. The Club Hill community was repaved and many of the curbs replaced. The entry way to Clusters II was rejuvenated with the removal and replacement of overgrown shrubs. An additional RainScape feature was created in the Burlingame Stream Valley, and additional trees were planted to replace some of those lost to storm damage.

Dog waste deposit stations were installed throughout our community by Montgomery County on a trial basis, and have been very successful. Nearly one ton of dog waste was removed from our community, which was a very significant reduction. All of that did not get on our shoes or wash off our greenspace and into our steams and ultimately into the bay.

Record setting rainfall totals impacted and delayed many of the routine activities of the homes corporation during the year. It has contributed to a considerable amount of damage to our greenspace by trash and recycling collection trucks. The increased parking of cars near the corners forces the trucks to drive onto the greenspace to make the tight turns.

We continue to hear concerns about parking problems throughout our community and are seeing an increased number of trucks, vans and cars parked along Stedwick and Watkins Mill roads. Our security service has been more aggressive in stickering cars that are in violation of parking rules. The Montgomery County Police listened to our concerns about the parking and long-term storage of large truck, trailers and construction equipment on the upper end of Watkins Mill Road, and we applaud their success in addressing that problem.

The smooth operation of the Stedwick Homes Corporation results from the cooperative efforts of our board of directors, our management team, our contractors and our residents. Thanks to all our board members for volunteering their time and efforts; to Community Manager Andrea Mandato and her team; and to all our contractors, especially the team from Kline Landscaping, which provides our landscaping and snow removal services. Audrey Houser, our maintenance chair, deserves a special thank you for her tireless efforts working on maintenance related items, from evaluation of the problems through their correction, and finally payment for the work accomplished.

During the year, the board of directors has operated with two vacant positions.

The board of directors has worked to keep the Stedwick community an attractive place to live, to keep it safe and affordable and to be environmentally sensitive. That job has been a collaborative effort of the board members, our community manager and our contractors. Thanks to all of them for their efforts.

STORM DRAINS

There are numerous storm drains located along the curbs throughout the community. Please do not dispose of any items in the storm drains! Placing an item such as a water bottle in the drain may seem harmless, but it can be the start of a very costly problem, which can translate into increased assessment fees. Remember: no bottles, paint cans, hazardous materials such as paint, oils, gasoline, etc. are ever to be placed in the storm drains. Help keep our community water system flowing efficiently and protect your property from flood damage.

TOWING

The current Middle Village Parking policy states:

"All vehicles parked overnight in the community are required to display a MVHC parking tag/permit or they are subject to immediate towing. For purposes of these Rules, overnight is defined as parking a vehicle in MV anytime between 11 p.m. and 5 a.m."

"Parking tag/permit must be clearly/properly displayed, on the driver's side, facing the front windshield, on vehicles parked in a reserved parking space, or parked in the community overnight. Tags/permits can be hung from the rearview mirror or taped to the driver's side dashboard or front windshield, front side facing toward the windshield."

"Failure to properly display the current year's parking tag/ permit will lead to immediate towing – even if vehicle is parked in the appropriate reserved parking space. No warnings or notifications will be issued."

"No commercial vehicles or trailers of any type, campers, or recreational vehicles shall be permitted to remain overnight on either the property of a private dwelling unit or on the community-owned property within Middle Village. For pur-

poses of these rules, over-night is defined as parking a vehicle between 11 p.m. and 5 a.m."

"Commercial vehicles include vehicles with any type of writing or printing (let-ters, words, pictures, insignia, etc.) identifying a firm, organization, service, product, etc., of any kind, type or description. All vehicles carrying ladders, pipes, ladder racks, truck-loaded tools or truckloaded tool boxes, etc., will be considered commercial. Vans used for delivering, storing or transporting goods or cargo are also considered to be commercial vehicles and are prohibited from remaining overnight in the community. Police vehicles are exempted."

"No commercial vehicles (including commercial pickup trucks) shall be permitted to remain overnight in the community. Pickup trucks must not have ladder racks, truckloaded tools or truck-loaded toolboxes. Further, pickup trucks may not park overnight in the community with any cargo, items or material of any kind in the truck bed (landscaping debris, tools, boxes, trash, equipment, etc.) that exceeds the height of the truck bed sides or that extends beyond the tailgate. Pickup trucks with cargo that meet this description will be considered commercial vehicles and are not permitted to park in the community overnight. Violations are subject to immediate towing.

DID YOU KNOW...

All vehicles parked in unreserved parking spaces, whether covered or uncovered, must be moved at least every 30 days. If the vehicle is not relocated, a violation sticker/tag will be attached to the vehicle and the vehicle will be subject to towing—at the vehicle owner's expense—48 to 72 hours after the sticker is attached.

ASSESSMENTS

We live in a community that requires every homeowner to pay assessment fees. Assessments are used to pay contractors for landscaping, snow removal, trash collection, collection of illegally dumped trash, lighting, repairs on community property, etc. If you are a homeowner, you were provided with this information during closing.

Reminder: Assessments are due to be paid monthly. Your payment must be received by ComSource on or before the 15th of the month to avoid late charges. Your regular payments allow us to continue providing services to our community.

Homeowners who are delinquent with their assessment payments must pay their past due balance in full or make arrangements to pay them. The first step to making payment arrangements is to contact Delphine Matthews at 301-924-7355 or dmatthews@comsource.com.

Glenview Mansion and Croydon Creek walk

The Seneca Valley Sugarloafers Volksmarch Club is sponsoring a Glenview Mansion and Croydon Creek walk in Rockville on Saturday, April 13. There are two trails: 10km (rated 2B) and 5km (rated 2A).

The 10km trail has both paved and natural surface sections. The natural surface section starts at the Croydon Creek Nature Center Trail Head and follows the trails along an abandoned section of Avery Road, into the forest, past an abandoned house foundation and cellar and along Croydon Creek to the dam. There are some short steep climbs along the creek. The walk then continues to and through the Glenview Mansion Gardens and then past the F. Scott Fitzgerald Theater. Parking is available in and behind the shopping center. The walk is free unless Volksmarchers want to register for IVV credit for \$3. The start time is between 9:30 a.m. and noon. Participants must finish the walk by 3 p.m.

Restrooms are available at the shopping center and at Croydon Creek Nature Center. Pets are allowed but must be leashed at all times during the walk.




