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MVF awards scholarships to four Village high school graduates

The Montgomery Village Foundation (MVF) once again joined the Watkins Mill and Gaithersburg High Schools' Parent Teacher Student Associations (PTSA) to continue the MVF Scholarship Fund, now completing its 27th year. Since the program's inception in 1991, scholarships amounting to over \$50,000 have been awarded to Village high school seniors. Through this fund, Village residents are able to show their support by encouraging student leadership and scholastic achievement while assisting graduating seniors in furthering their education. The amount available for each school is entirely determined by the amount donated by Village residents.



This year, MVF scholarships were granted to four Village students: Sarah Elbeshbishi and Elisabeth Warren of Watkins Mill High School (WMHS); and Katie Crocker and Charmaine Pfinayi of Gaithersburg High School (GHS). MVF Board approved guidelines for the awards require that the applicants be Montgomery Village residents who have actively participated in and been leaders of community or civic activities, clubs or organizations and who have demonstrated high scholastic achievement.



Summer updates

MVF BOARD RETREAT

The MVF Board held its strategic planning retreat on Saturday, June 2 in the North Creek Board Room. The retreat included a financial overview by CFO Daniel Salazar, which detailed 2018 YTD Revenues and Expenses and a discussion of Capital Contribution Fee Revenue. Salazar also provided 2019 budget assumptions, which had been previously reviewed by the Personnel Committee.

Other topics included modifications to the MVF Mission Statement and Guiding Principles to include verbiage stating the importance of inclusiveness and diversity in our community, and support for business and economic development. A major focus of the retreat was a presentation and discussion of the Recreation and Parks Strategic Plan. There was a presentation on the status of the organization's 2018 strategic goals as well.

UPCOUNTY CITIZENS ADVISORY BOARD (UCAB) ANNUAL MEETING

During their annual meeting on June 18, UCAB presented a special gift to County Executive Ike Leggett for his leadership and service to the county over the last 12 years. In turn, Leggett presented service awards to outgoing board members, including Montgomery Village residents Mark Firley and Kevin Linck, who both had served as past chairs of the board.

This was Leggett's final meeting with the advisory board. Leggett noted that he believes he is leaving the county in better shape than it was when he assumed office in 2006. One of his biggest accomplishments was to get the budget under control after a number of years of double digit increases, which he called unsustainable. He noted that many difficult choices needed to be made, including renegotiation of union contracts to get wages in line; budget cuts to a number of departments, including libraries and schools; and keeping tax rate increases in check, all while the county's population was growing, with an economically needier demographic.

In more recent years, as the economy grew stronger, additional funding was made available for important priorities, including public safety, economic development, affordable housing and schools. Leggett lauded progress, especially with affordable housing and senior housing, noting that approximately 77,000 affordable units were created during his tenure. He also noted progress with transportation projects; however, he admitted the difficulty of managing growth with the timing of implementing transportation alternatives and the need for more funding.

With regard to the upcounty, Leggett noted a couple of transportation projects that he believes are important to implement, including an alternative to M-83, such as a parkway; improvements to Goshen Road; the Corridor Cities Transitway; and I-270 enhancements.

The creation of jobs and improved economic development, including securing the Amazon bid, was another topic of Leggett's comments. He noted the importance of providing more technical training and education using public/ private partnerships as a vehicle to reaching more high school graduates who may not be seeking a four-year college degree.

Leggett asked Police Chief Tom Manger to comment on the increased coordination efforts between police and school officials to enhance safety for all students. Manger indicated that there is a new state law that puts the onus on the school system to provide for better planning for school safety, but that he and his team have been meeting on an almost daily basis to identify strategies and resources to meet the state's new law. He indicated that additional resources are clearly going to be needed, not only to provide more school resource officers at the middle school level, but other resources as well.

2. The *Montgomery Village News* will make every effort to publish all letters received during the weeks prior to

publication that meet the criteria of this policy.

3. All letters (typed, handwritten or e-mailed) must be received no later than 5 p.m. on the Monday prior to publication and distribution. When a holiday occurs on a deadline Monday, Letters to the Editor must be received no later than noon on the subsequent Tuesday prior to the Friday publication and distribution.

4. Letters must bear the writer's name, address and telephone number for verification purposes. E-mailed letters should contain the subject line "Letter to the Editor." The sole use of pen names, initials or the complete omission of a signature will eliminate a letter from consideration from publication. A request from the author to withhold the name or mark the letter anonymous will eliminate the letter from consideration. 5. All letters are subject to condensation or deferral to the next issue by the editor for space considerations, if absolutely necessary. Editor is to so indicate any condensations.

6. All letters may not exceed 300 words. Longer letters will be eliminated from consideration for publication in the *Village News*. As time permits, the writers may be notified and given the opportunity to shorten the letter for future publication. "Look Out" for MCDOT's new pedestrian and bikeway infrastructure

Look Out! The county is changing pedestrian and bikeway infrastructure to make it safer for everyone. The changes will designate road space for cyclists and clarify where people should walk and cross streets or bikeways safely. So what's changing? Green bike boxes will be added to the front of a traffic lane, providing cyclists with a safe, visible way to move ahead of vehicles at a red light.

FOR DRIVERS

You will need to stop behind the green bike box without crossing into it. When the light turns green, cyclists will go through the intersection first. You will no longer be able to turn right on red. Right turn is only allowed when the light is green. When turning right, watch for and yield to cyclists going straight.

FOR CYCLISTS

While at an intersection, merge from the bike lane to the bike box, making sure to spread out to increase visibility.

When the light turns green you will need to return back to the bike lane. Remember, you



must obey all of the same traffic laws as motorists.

FOR PEDESTRIANS

Be on the lookout for cyclists and motorists who are navigating a new traffic pattern. When it's time to cross, use the designated crosswalk and avoid using the green path reserved for cyclists.

SIGNS AND SIGNALS

There will be new bike traffic signals installed at some intersections. Bicycle traffic signals will provide guidance for bicyclists at intersections where they may have different needs from other road users.

- Cyclists may need to use vehicular signals, bike signals or pedestrian signals by signage at intersections. Drivers may turn across
- cycle tracks and bike lanes

after signaling and yielding, unless there is a "No Right Turn on Red" sign.

Everyone must all follow traffic laws and obey signs and signals.

Improvements to South Valley Park approved at MVF Board meeting

At the May 31 Montgomery Village Foundation (MVF) Board of Directors meeting, several bids were approved to facilitate enhancements to South Valley Park, specifically the football field renovation project. The Board approved an irrigation system, laser grading of the field and fencing—enhancements that will upgrade the existing football field and allow for other uses at the site.

The Board authorized Executive Vice (EVP) President Dave Humpton to execute contracts with several companies to compete the work at South Valley Park. K and C Grounds was awarded a bid for \$27,500 for the grading of the fields. Because an irrigation system will be installed, this is a necessary step to ensure that the fields drain properly. Hydro-Tech Irrigation was awarded a bid for \$45,000 to install the irrigation system. This system will keep the Bermudagrass surface properly watered, protecting the investment in this field.

Hercules Fence was awarded a bid for \$18,875 to enclose the area with an 8-foot high fence to further protect the investments in the park. Funds for the fence and irrigation system are available through the Capital Contribution Fund, and the grading work will be paid for from Reserves. The goal of the South Valley Park renovation project is to create a premiere sports field facility in Montgomery Village. This upgraded field will allow for football, soccer and other sports, and complements other recent enhancements to the park, including the restroom and concession stand facility.

OTHER AGENDA ITEMS

Following former Board member Tammy Holloway's resignation last December, the Board enacted the process to fill the vacancy earlier this year. During the meeting, two residents who previously applied for appointment to the vacancy were given the opportunity to address the Board and discuss their qualifications for the position. After brief questions of the candidates, the Board voted to appoint Benjamin Davis to fill the remainder of Holloway's term.

Davis, who currently serves on the Nominating Committee, hopes to bring his talents as a Management Analyst at NIST to help MVF continue to plan for the future and succeed as a community.

Additionally, Melanie O'Brien was reappointed as the chair to the Communications Committee.

PRESIDENT'S REMARKS

Board President Glenn Gargan thanked those in attendance as well as the Board members for adjusting to the date change of the meeting.

EVP REPORT

EVP Humpton thanked staff for their hard work in opening MVF's pools, noting that there is a lot of behind the scenes action that takes place to maintain them in the off season and prepare them for opening each summer.

Humpton also said Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) Project Manager Corey Pitts from Montgomery County DOT will come to the June Board meeting to talk about the progress of the BRT.

On other development issues, Humpton said that Monument Realty, owners of the former golf course property, were still waiting for a certified site plan from the county. He noted that progress was being made, but it was slower than Monument had hoped; discussion about the parks agreement with the county is taking longer than expected.

Atlantic Realty Companies (ARC), owners of the Village Center, received a site plan approval from the county as well. Humpton said ARC plans to meet with the Commercial Architectural Review Committee (CARC) in August to discuss the approved site plan and how phases of that would be introduced at the property.

When asked about the Professional Center, Humpton said he is unaware of any contracts on the site, but the owners of the site have said they have had some interest. As with all commercial sites, it will take time for the right developer to bring about the right plan that fits in the community.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Recently promoted CFO Daniel Salazar gave the Treasurer's Report in Bob Carey's absence. Salazar noted he was thankful and excited for the opportunity to serve as the CFO and looks forward to working with the Board in his new capacity.

Salazar reported the yearto-date (YTD) Net Income as \$240,000 favorable to the budget, as well as Revenue in excess of \$55,000, mainly due to the sale of the Cider Mill Apartments earlier this year. Personnel costs have also been favorable to the budget by approximately \$107,000 due to three open positions within the organization. Operating Expenses, including office expenses, service contracts, landscaping and lake and pond maintenance costs are all tracking favorable to the budget.

For the month of April, Net Income was reported as \$63,000 ahead of budget. Revenue is tracking approximately \$39,000 favorable to the budget from pool memberships, disclosure fees, camps and classes and personnel costs. Monthly Operating Expenses are tracking to the budget.

Salazar noted the Balance Sheet remains strong, showing \$8.9 million of MVF's \$19.2 million total assets in Cash and Investments. Assessment Receivables are also favorable to the budget and tracking ahead of last year. MVF currently holds \$2.2 million in Undesignated Reserves.

NEXT MEETING

The next MVF Board of Directors meeting is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, June 28 in the North Creek Board Room, 20125 Arrowhead Road. The meeting begins promptly at 7:30 p.m. with Residents Time. Residents are invited and encouraged to attend. 

Montgomery County Short-Term Rental Law takes effect July 1

A new law set to take effect on Sunday, July 1 will regulate short-term residential rentals currently available through online platforms such as Airbnb, Craigslist, FlipKey and HomeAway, and require property owners to register and license their rentals. More information about the new law and the licensing requirements is available online at www.montgomerycountymd.gov/ short-term-rental. Montgomery County joins jurisdictions such as Philadelphia and Hawaii in requiring such rentals to be licensed. Several counties across the United States also require licensing.

On October 1, 2017, the county council adopted zoning text amendment (ZTA) 16-03 and Bill 2-16 to define shortterm residential rentals and establish licensing regulations. The county's Department of Health and Human Services' Licensure and Regulatory Services will be responsible for licensing and enforcement.

"This law will allow our

residents to participate in the growing 'Airbnb' economy while ensuring that we have limits to protect our neighborhoods and sense of community," said County Council President Hans Riemer, lead sponsor of the legislation.

A short-term residential rental is a unit/room in a single-family home, apartment or condominium that is available for a fee for less than 30 consecutive days through online sites such as Airbnb, Craigslist, FlipKey and HomeAway.

Property owners who rent their property, or part of their property, for short-term lodging must also pay the county's Room Rental and Transient Tax, through the Department of Finance, Division of Treasury, a requirement that went into effect July 1, 2017.

The county partnered with Bear Cloud Software, developers of STR Helper, a software application to manage compliance, registration, licensing and complaints regarding short-term rentals. STR Helper

is used in more than 70 cities and counties in the United States.

Current owners are being notified in writing about the new law and the need to register the property. The registration portal will periodically scan online sites for new properties and owners will be notified. Property owners who do not receive a letter are still required to apply for a license.

The annual license fee is \$150 plus applicable processing fees. Failure to comply with licensing requirements may result in additional fees, penalties and possible restrictions on future rentals.



End of spring update

by the Northgate Board of Directors

AB Veirs has been awarded the contracts to repair the street at the front end of Aspenwood Lane, as well as to completely redo Maple Leaf Court. As noted in a previous column, the paving priorities had to be shifted due to the deterioration of Maple Leaf Court. The court will be completely milled and repaved.

The initial project to paint 100 fiberglass light poles was successful, so the board contracted with Shall's Construction to paint the remainder of the fiberglass poles in Northgate. The paint is to protect the fiberglass and improve the appearance. Aluminum poles do not require the same maintenance.

A drainage repair project between Maple Leaf Drive and Maple Leaf Court will commence soon, with regrading and other work taking place.

The McKendree courtyard project should (finally) be completed soon. Northgate raised a number of issues it was not satisfied with, so the county contractor needed to do extra work. At the June meeting, the board accepted the 2017 Audit, which showed the association in good condition.

Private Property Maintenance inspections have been taking place. If you get a notice, please take care of the issue.

Once again: We truly have greater imaginations than what it seems like with the constant repetition of our trash information, but the message on trash still is not registering with some residents. We will keep repeating the Northgate trash information as long as problems in the community exist: Northgate provides ample resources to handle trash, including twice-weekly trash pickups and bulk pickups once-per-week as needed. The county provides onceper-week recycling. With few exceptions, that should cover every resident's trash removal needs.

Those exceptions can almost always be handled by taking the items to the Shady Grove Transfer Station, a short distance from Montgomery Village (MVA>MidCounty Highway>Shady Grove Road>Left on 355>almost immediate Left into Transfer Station).

The Points and Overlea have trash pickup on Mondays and Thursdays. Bulk pickups are Thursday. All the other neighborhoods – Apple Ridge, Dorsey's Regard, the McKendrees, Shadow Oak and Williams Range – have trash pickup on Tuesdays and Fridays. Bulk pickups are on Fridays. Do not put your trash out earlier than the evening before pickup!

Per Montgomery County Code, residents are responsible for providing containers with tight fitting lids for storage of solid waste in single-family houses and townhouses. All solid waste storage containers must be rigid plastic or metal, vermin-proof and equipped with tight fitting lids. The Division of Housing Code Enforcement enforces trash and debris on a property.

Reconvened Annual Meeting

Since quorum was not reached at the Middle Village Homes Corporation Annual Meeting, notice is hereby given that a second meeting is scheduled for 7 p.m. on Tuesday, June 26 in the Thomas Choice Clubhouse, 19401 Brassie Place. Pursuant to/in accordance with Section 5-206 (a), Section 5-206 (b), and Section 5-206 (c) of the Annotated Code of Maryland which states: "At the additional meeting, the members present in person or by proxy constitute a quorum. A majority of the members present in person or by proxy may approve or authorize the proposed action at the additional meeting and may take any other action which could have been taken at the original meeting if a sufficient number of members had been pre-sent."

TRASH

Placing bulk trash in the community is a violation that is subject to a fine; any resident caught dumping bulk trash on Middle Village property will be fined \$250. Homeowners will be fined if they or their tenants violate the trash policy. Trash policy violations include, but are not limited to:

- 1. Placing trash out in plastic bags instead of a trash receptacle with a lid.
- 2. Placing trash/recycling out on inappropriate days/nonpickup days.
- 3. Trashcans that are overflowing.
- 4. Placing trash out on common area spaces instead of in front of home.
- Trash includes loose trash, bagged trash and trash in cans.

Are you making improvements or renovating your home? Please note that construction trash and debris is not permitted to be dumped in the community. Inform your contractor that they cannot dispose of the construction debris on Middle Village property. They must dispose of it off site. The resident will be fined if they or their contractor is dumping bulk trash, construction debris, furniture, etc. on Middle Village property.

REMEMBER

- Do not place household trash or recycling out until the evening before pickup or the morning of pickup. Any other time is a violation of the community trash policy and is subject to fines.
- Place the lid firmly on the trash can.
- If you have more trash than what your trash can is able to hold, purchase an addi-

tional trash can!

Note: If it does not fit into the blue recycling container, it is not recycling. If it does not fit into a 35-gallon trashcan, it is not normal household trash. If it is yard waste, it must be in a paper bag or bundled and placed out with recycling.

STORM DRAINS

There are numerous storm drains located along the curbs throughout the community. Please do not dispose of any items in the storm drains other than water! Placing an item such as a water bottle in the drain may seem harmless, but it can be the start of a very costly problem, which can translate into increased assessment fees. Remember, no bottles; paint cans; or hazardous materials such as paint, oils, gasoline, etc. are ever to be placed in the storm drains. Help keep our community water system flowing efficiently and protect your property from flood damage.

ASSESSMENTS

We live in a community that requires every homeowner to pay assessment fees. Assessments are used to pay contractors for landscaping, snow removal, trash collection, collection of illegally dumped trash, lighting, repairs on community property, etc. If you are a homeowner, you were provided with this information during closing.

Reminder: Assessments are due paid monthly. Your payment must be received by ComSource on or before the 15th of the month to avoid late charges. Your regular payments allow us to continue providing services to our community.

Homeowners who are delinquent with their assessment payments must pay their past due balance in full or make arrangements to pay them. The first step to making payment arrangements is to contact Delphine Matthews at 301-924-7355 or *dmatthews@ comsource.com*.

Gaithersburg High School Principal leaves to take on national position

After 11 years at Gaithersburg High School (GHS), as of June 30, Dr. Christine Handy is taking a leave of absence and will no longer serve as GHS principal. In a letter to school parents, Handy said that "the decision is bittersweet," but she is excited about the opportunity that lies ahead for her. Handy has been elected as President of the National Association of Secondary School Principals (NASSP), the leading organization and voice for principals and other school leaders across the United States; she will hold this position for the 2018-2019 school year.

NASSP's mission is to transform education through school leadership, recognizing that the fulfillment of each student's potential relies on great leaders in every school, committed to the success of each student. Reflecting its long-standing commitment to student leadership development, NASSP administers the National Honor Society, National Junior Honor Society, National Elementary Honor Society and National Association of Student Councils.

As NASSP president, Handy will be Chairman of the Board for the association; she will also represent high schools across the nation; advocate on Capitol Hill; visit with legislators; attend state conferences for the state secondary school principals associations; and provide professional development.

The NASSP press release notes that Handy is assuming a leadership position at NASSP "during a crucial time in the history of U.S. public education." The current presidential administration has reintroduced discussion about the appropriate federal role in education, which has reenergized proponents of school choice and privatization. Handy will play a crucial role in representing her principal colleagues nationwide in those important debates.

"Christine Handy understands the unique role of school leaders in school improvement and student success," remarked NASSP Executive Director JoAnn Bartoletti. "We look forward to her leadership as NASSP president in 2018-19 as we continue our mission of supporting leaders to transform education for the future."

Handy believes that it is the job of school leaders to ensure that every student is ready to realize their goals, dreams and aspirations upon concluding their education. In 2003, Handy became county representative for the Maryland Association of Secondary School Principals (MASSP). She later served

as secretary, president-elect, president, past president and state coordinator on the executive board. In 2006, Handy was named the Maryland High School Principal of the Year. Since 2014, she has served on the NASSP Board of Directors as a regional representative.

"School leadership is one of the most important factors in a child's education, second only to instruction," Handy has said. "With uncertainty dominating conversations about the future of American education policy, it is an honor to serve in this role and work with NASSP to provide school leadership with the knowledge, tools and support they need to ensure the success of all students."

As she leaves GHS, Handy is proud of all that has been accomplished during her tenure as principal. She notes that together with the community and students, they have "embraced our diversity, built a new school and excelled in the classroom." She calls her time as principal at GHS "an amazing and most memorable experience" and thanks the community for their support. Following her sabbatical year of service with NASSP, when Handy returns, she will be placed at a different MCPS high school.

Meanwhile, Cary Dimmick, principal of Sligo Middle School in Silver Spring, has been appointed to lead Gaithersburg starting July 1. Dimmick spent a decade working in high schools before serving for the past three years at Sligo, and says he is eager to work with that age group again.




